Klickitat PUD Dedicates Lyle Wastewater Treatment Plant Project

On April 28, Public Utility District No. 1 of Klickitat County (KPUD) dedicated its new wastewater treatment plant at Lyle, Washington.

The plant includes new headworks, a sequencing batch reactor system, aerobic sludge digestion, drying beds and a disinfection system. The improvements will allow the PUD's Lyle wastewater system to comply with state and federal water quality standards, while benefitting the customers of Lyle.

The planning and design phase of the project was completed with funding from the public works board and the U.S. Forest Service. KPUD completed construction through a Community Investment Fund Grant from the Washington State Department of Trade and Economic Development, as well as a generous grant and zero-interest loan funding package from the Washington State Department of Ecology.

Since 2001, representatives from KPUD, the Department of Ecology, Department of Trade and Economic Development and the Lyle Community Council have worked together to bring this project on line.

During the dedication ceremony, KPUD Commissioner Ray Mosbrucker and General Manager Tom Svendsen acknowledged Gray &
