Generator Safety is Crucial

Generators can pose serious safety hazards when used improperly. The National Electrical Safety Code prohibits anyone from connecting a portable generator to household wiring or any other source leading to KPUD's power lines. In doing so, the generator's electrical energy, through your panel, meter and service wire, could back-feed to the transformer and generate up to 7,200 volts in the power lines. This could result in deadly consequences for our KPUD linemen.

A permanently installed generator requires installation of a control panel and transfer switch to isolate the generator from the PUD's power supply. Always check and follow local, state and national fire and electric codes. It is safest to have a licensed electrician install the switching system. Call the PUD when installation is complete to let us know about your backup system.

Remember, you are responsible for any injuries or damages to your property, your neighbors' property, or PUD equipment and personnel for an improperly installed or operated generator.

Lastly, never run a generator indoors. It emits poisonous fumes. ■
