County Cattlewomen. Beef products and other foods were handed out to people in the community who are in need.

Layne has helped set out the flags at the Centerville Cemetery for Memorial Day weekend. He also has worked with his 4-H club to make fleece tie blankets that are donated to the children's hospital in Portland.

Lavne is involved in the Centerville School associated student body and served as an ASB representative during the previous school year. He participates in club football, basketball and baseball, and plans to play sports for Centerville School this year.

Among his other activities, Layne enjoys participating in rodeo events, such as calf riding and goat tying. He plans to start breakaway roping next spring. He also intends to continue participating in 4-H with his steer project.

Layne has had the support and assistance of his family. His parents, Shad and Jenny, and his little sister, Josie, are there with Layne as he continues his activities.

Layne says he has learned a lot about life during his two years of 4-H.
