Thank You, Lineworkers

April 18 is National Lineworker Appreciation Day. With the unanimous passage of Senate Resolution 95 in 2013, the U.S. Senate created the day following the heroic response to Hurricane Sandy in 2012.

After the hurricane, approximately 67,000 of the nation's estimated 115,000 lineworkers responded to help repair damages inflicted to the region's power infrastructure.

Senate Resolution 95 honors "the contributions of these brave men and women who protect public safety," noting that lineworkers are often first responders during storms and other catastrophic events, "working to make the scene safe for other public safety heroes."

Lineworkers "put their lives on the line every day with little recognition from the community regarding the danger of their work," says the resolution, which was cosponsored by Georgia Sen. Johnny Isakson and Colorado Sen. Michael Bennet.

Klickitat PUD recognizes lineworkers as the backbone of our utility. Our lineworkers often go to work in hazardous conditions to build and maintain the power supply to our customers 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Without the quality maintenance and system improvement work performed by lineworkers, KPUD would not reach the 99% reliability goal we strive to meet.
