National Lineworker Appreciation Day, celebrated annually on April 18, recognizes the contributions and sacrifices of these critical responders. The holiday was designated by the U.S. Senate on April 18, 2013, in the aftermath of the devastating Hurricane Sandy in 2012. Around 67,000 lineworkers—out of an estimated 115,000 nationwide—promptly responded to assist in the restoration of the country's power infrastructure.

Senate Resolution 95, the bill to create Linworker Appreciation Day, garnered unanimous approval in the U.S. Senate, emphasizing the crucial role of lineworkers in safeguarding our communities' electricity supply. At Klickitat PUD, we deeply value our lineworkers as indispensable members of our utility family. They bravely tackle hazardous and often adverse conditions to build, maintain and promptly restore unplanned outages on our system, ensuring uninterrupted power supply to our customers 24/7.

Lineworkers have been an integral part of society since the early days of electrification. As electricity became more widespread, the demand for skilled individuals capable of installing, repairing and maintaining electrical infrastructure grew. In the early 20th century, as rural areas began receiving electricity through New Deal programs, including the Rural Electrification Act, lineworkers played a crucial role in extending power lines to these underserved regions. Throughout history, lineworkers have braved challenging working conditions—from extreme weather to hazardous environments—to ensure that electricity reaches homes, businesses and industries.

Linework is inherently dangerous. Lineworkers face risks such as electrocution, falls and accidents while working at heights

or in remote locations.
